Boys Go 2-1 At Chappy

Mulvane 3rd; Jags A Bump In The Road

The road to the 33rd annual Roadrunner Classic at Chaparral went through Andover Central Jaguars.

The road to a State tournament berth probably will to go through Andover Central, too.

The Mulvane High School Wildcat boys travelled that road last week and found it a bit bumpy. Central knocked the Cats into the third place game Friday night. Jan. 23, by holding off the Wildcats, 55-40, but Mulvane rebounded Saturday, Jan. 24, to take 3rd place by stopping Clearwater, 61-51

The MHS boys won in the first round Wednesday evening, Jan. 21, by 14 over Arkansas City, 53-39.

Andover Central went on to take the tournament championship, 61-50, against Winfield. The Wildcats have won the Roadrunner Classic only once. That title came in the 1984 season and propelled the Cats to the 4A State championship.

"The tournament was a positive for us," said Coach Ryan Herrs. "I think we learned some things, our kids grew. We won two out of three and we've won three out of the last four, so we're on a nice little streak."

"Going into the tournament, we knew if we wanted to play the late game on Saturday, we'd have to go through Andover Central Central's players knew they had to play a great game and they did. We saw them at their best (Stephen) DuCharme is just tough inside. He's a great player."

The Central Jaguars fived up to their No-I seed in the tournament and ran their record to 10-1. The Jags are one of the eight teams that will be in the field when the Mulvane 4A Sub-State opens in the first week of March.

The Roadrunner Classic gave Herrs and his Cats, now 5-7, some momentum heading into the last half of the year. It wasn't easy, though. Earlier this year, Mulvane blasted Clearwater, 75-49, but the Wildcats trailed the Indians, 13-7, after one quarter of play at Chappy.

"We tried to get the kids to understand that they had to play their best to heat Clearwater, and once we started doing things right, we started taking care of business."

The Cats bounced back in the 2nd quarter and took a two-point lead, 21-19, by half-time. Mulvane our-scored the Indians, 21-9,

in the 3rd quarter to take control of the game.

"We had a really good third quarter," said Herrs. "The biggest factor is we started getting the basketball into the post on offense. We've been trying to get our kids to look inside. I was so mad early in the 2nd quarter because we weren't getting the ball inside. Gavin (Snider) was working his tail off inside but our guards weren't getting him the ball. Once we started doing that, we broke the game open.

Snider finished with a career-high 24 points, hitting 11 of 13 shots. Zach Kimble was the only other Wildcat in double figures. He had 10 points. Guards Kiel Mangus and Nick Hansen scored seven points each and Greg Flores and Brad Enochs finished with six and five, respectively.

In the game against Central, the wheels came off in the second half after the two CTL teams battled to a tight first half AC was ahead, 24-20, at halftime. However, the Jaguars broke the game up by out-scoring the Cats, 17-5, in the 3rd quarter

"Our oftense just went stale in that quarter," said Herrs: "We couldn't find the bucket and you know what, we got good shots. It's tough when they have a big guy (6-7) like DuCharme in there. We just didn't take advantage of our opportunities."

The 3rd period started off harmlessly enough AC hit a lay-up behind the Cat defense. Then, another lay-up off their transition game "We needed a stop right then and didn't get one," observed Herrs "When you fall that far behind a team as good as Andover Central, it makes it really tough to get back. They don't make mistakes and they are used to winning."

Enochs had his best game as a Wildeat. He scored a career-best 16 points. Gavin Snider scored six points, Kimble had five and Hansen scored four.

"Enochs had a great game," said Herrs.
"He defended well, he scored well, he had a
fantastic game. We want him to be more
involved. One thing about Brad is that nothing gets him down. He plays hard regardless
of whether he's scoring or not."

The Wildcats started the tournament with a solid performance against Arkansas City. "That was our most complete game to date," pointed our Herrs. "The guys didn't have breakdowns, they didn't let Ark City go on a


