BBers Run Hot, Cold

There's a time to remember...and a time to forget.

Mulvane High School baseball coach Zeke Rash endured a little of each Thursday night, April 23, when Buhler came to Mulvane for a Chisholm Trail League doubleheader.

"A time to remember" was game No. 2, which saw the host Wildcats smother the Crusader offense behind a 16-hit assault for a 12-6 victory. "A time to forget" was the first game, which saw the Cats play terribly and Buhler pummel Mulvane pitching standout Ryan Rogers for a 15-3 decision.

The Wildcats were to have played Monday, April 27, at home against Andover but the game was postponed because of rain.

The split against the Crusaders left the MHS baseballers at 6-7 for the year overall and 4-6 in the CTL.

"Those were two pretty opposite games," pointed out Rash. "We'd like to forget about the first one. Buhler has a real good ball club. Ryan started but he wasn't sharp and they just jumped all over him for six runs. Our defense wasn't sharp, either. The kids made some errors, like a couple of pop-ups that nobody took charge on and they fell. That's something we practice every day, but it just didn't happen. They put us back on our heels pretty quickly and we never recovered."

Buhler, which improved its record to 8-4, zipped out to a 4-0 lead, then put the game away with a nine-run fifth after the Wildcats moved close with three runs in the bottom of the fourth.

"Ryan's fastball didn't have near the velocity that he normally has," said Rash. "And he had some control problems. They also have a very good hitting ball club and were hitting the ball around the field. It got pretty bad in the 5th when they scored nine runs to end it. I think Buhler is probably the best hitting ball club we've seen this year. Even at his best, they probably were going to score some runs off Ryan, and we didn't help him with our defense. It was just a combination of all those things rolled into one."

The Cats, who could manage only four hits, scored three times in the 4th to get back to within three runs (6-3). Darrin Erbert slapped a single to left and Chad Gerwick walked. Bryce Schumacher singled and that filled the bases for Justin Horton, whose base hit scored one. DH Garrett Hennes grounded out and another run scored, and the third run came in when Eric Tatum singled to left. That was all of the Wildcats' hits in the game.

"They pitched a kid that we beat around pretty good last year," said Rash. "We're hitting about .301 as a team this year and I
