"On paper, it looked really good, but when you looked at the final score, it wasn't so hot," pointed out Todd Barker, the MHS boys coach. "We had more points from the field. We out-rebounded them, 32-23. We shot better from the field than they did. But the one stat that did us in was free throws. They made more than we got to shout and that hurt us,"

That torpedoed the ship, as they say. The Rockets, raising their conference record to 3-1, made 20 of 34 at the free throw line, taking advantage of 21 Mulvane fouls. That was just enough to enable Rose Hill to thwart the final charge of the Wildcats in the last quarter. For Rose Hill, 11 of their 4th quarter points came at the stripe. That was more than enough to make the Rockets forget about a 47-43 loss to the Cats in the third game of the year.

"We tried to make a run at them in the last quarter after they got a little edge," said Barker, noting the score was knotted at 32s going into the final eight minutes. "We had

to foul them to get the ball after we fell behind by two and it sure makes it tough to catch someone when they're hitting their free throws like that. We got the clock stopped but couldn't take advantage of it."

When the two teams played in December, it was the Cats who cashed in at the line, big-time. Mulvane made 27 of 42 from the line while Rose Hill shot freebees only 13 times.

The Wildcats battled back to within two with only 40 seconds left and appeared ready to make the homecoming crowd go home happy. It didn't happen. "We had a time out and wanted to set our press up to get a turnover or a quick foul," said Barker, whose Wildcats slipped to 4-4 over all and to 2-2 in the league. "We got the foul but they made their free throws."

Barker felt his troopers did a fine job defending the Rockets and especially their top gun, Rhett Hansen. "We wanted to contain him because he had been fighting people up," said Barker, "so we went with a 1-2-2 match-up and it was fairly successful for what we wanted to do. We shut him down from the field and kept him off the glass. We just didn't take care of the other kids and put them on the line."

The zone also was effective against the RH guards, who are quick. "The first game, their guards were so much quicker than we were so we stayed in the zone most of the game," said Barker. "While we did a nice


