Cat Boys Stick Lions; Sub-State Next

The Mulvane High School boys closed their regular season by making amends Tuesday night, Feb. 22, against Goddard.

The Wildcat staff felt the boys let Goddard off the hook earlier this year but in front of the home folks Tuesday, the Cats snagged the Lions, 51-49, giving Coach Dale Landes his seventh victory of the season, one better than last year.

The win also served as a lift for the Wildcats heading into the Bluestem Class 4A Sub-State next week. The Wildcats were seeded No. 6 and will play the No. 3 seeded Rockets at 7 p.m. Tuesday night, March 1, in Rose Hill.

"We played with a lot more intensity and a lot more emotion and that's the reason we improved our record from last year," said Landes. "Our kids have really played well down the stretch. We battled back the whole game. Our kids never gave in."

Goddard, which beat Mulvane by six in Goddard, squirted ahead by six in the first quarter but the Cats came on the rest of the

Maize popped the Wildcats, 63-53, but the Cats played like they had tigers in their tanks against the Eagles, who moved into second place in the CTL behind Valley Center at 7-3 in the league.

"I felt we accomplished-playing a fine game with great intensity," said Landes. "We played a lot harder and a lot tougher than we did against Wellington. I told the kids that was something they needed to do, to get back on track and play with high intensity and emotion. I thought we did that."

Especially this time of the year with substate right around the corner, everybody wants to be at their intense best. "You hope to fine tune some things and get ready for sub-state but against Wellington, I thought we took a step backwards," added Landes. "Against Maize, we took some giant steps forward because we play with feeling."

It's almost becoming a broken record, but the Wildcats again were beaten at the free throw stripe. Maize won the game, although being out-scored by five field goals. The Eagles made 22 of 32 at the line. And what about the Wildcats? They shot four and made two. Go figure.

"I was really upset with the officiating," said Landes, who hardly gets made about anything. "It's certainly confusing because they were in a half-court trap and putting a lot of pressure on half-court. We were going man-to-man full court but it's hard to figure."

Maize led all the way. The MHS Cats pulled to within two with one minute left before intermission. "We decided to put Jason and Dan on the bench because we didn't want them to get a foul before the half and they scored two quick baskets and got up six, then in the first two minutes of the third quarter, we didn't play well defensively and that allowed them to extend their lead to 11," said Landes.

Mulvane chopped it down to four midway into the final stanza with tough defense
