Mulvane's Clutch Shooting

Keeps Title Hopes Glowing

Mulvane used some clutch free throwing down the stretch and its ball-hawking defense to take a big step toward the No. 2 seed and a home berth in the first round of sub-state play by topping Clearwater, 66-62, Tuesday night, Feb. 24, in a non-league outing in Mulvane.

Coupled with a 67-53 verdict last Friday over Valley Center, the Cats will take a 14-5 record into the seeding process for the 4A sub-state at Augusta.

The Mulvane junior varsity had hot hands in Shay Cornejo and Neal Hamilton as it pasted Clearwater, 86-78.

Some clutch tosses from the stripe sealed the victory for MHS. After the Indians had closed to within two (62-60) with 45 seconds left, Curtis Hicks slipped in two free throws with 16 seconds remaining and Todd Fox iced things with a pair with seven ticks left.

"We got the people we needed to have at the line to the stripe and they made the shots," said Charlie Mason, Mulvane, High School coach who closed to within one victory of his 100th in his eight seasons here. "There was a lot on the line even though it wasn't a conference game. We needed it for a better seed plus they beat us last year. I was proud of the kids. The defense is really picking up. Clearwater's big kid (Chris Hickman) scored only three points in the first half and he's one of the best big men in the state."

Bottling up Hickman enabled Mulvane to forge up to a 10-point lead in the first three quarters before Hickman led the charge back into the game with nine points in the last period.

For the Wildcats, guard Hicks scored a game-high 22 points, including hitting six of seven at the free throw line. Both Morgan LeClair and Todd Fox added 16-point games and the other two starters, Kyle Steadman and Andrew Swayne scored six each.

Cornejo drilled a career-high 37 points and Hamilton added a career-high 28 as the Cat jayvees rambled against Clearwater. Norman Bowen added eight for the Cats.
