"first season" is over and Mulvane boys basketball coach Charlie Mason is now focusing in on what some call "the real season."

The Wildcats concluded their regular season with a flourish Friday night, Feb. 24, at home against hapless Augusta. The Wildcats hardly broke out a sweat in disposing of the Orioles by a 64-30 count before a jam-packed crowd on hand to watch both homecoming festivities and the Wildcat juggernaut.

The Chisholm Trail League victory clinched second place in the CTL Division I behind Buhler with a 9-1 league record. Overall, the Cats posted an 18-2 regular season, making Mulvane's first basketball winning season since the 1971-72 campaign a dandy.

Augusta, on the other hand, has had a dismal year sports-wise. The Orioles capped an 0-20 season--a record matched by the Augusta girls team.

"As far as I know, this has to be one of the best seasons at Mulvane," saift "I don't know how many 20-win seasons the school has had but a 20-2 record comes to mind from quite a few years ago."

The Orioles provided little competition. They came out in a stall but that lasted only through the first quarters. The Wildcats' quickness made it difficult to slow things down with their pressing tactics.

"That's all they could do," defended Mason. "Augusta had to hold the ball and we continued to press when they went into the stall. We wanted to put pressure on and we got some turnovers. got them into foul trouble and after that, it was only a matter of time.'

After being tight in the early going. the Wildcats broke out to a four-point lead after one quarter, then enlarged that to a 26-16 halftime margin. And it wasn't long before Mulvane had it to 40-16 when the Orioles were held scoreless the first four minutes of the third quarter.

Mason said he was proud of the accomplishments wo far by his fifth addition of Cats. We've accomplished a number of goals," said Mason. "We went undefeated at home, we almost won the league championship, we won two tournaments we intended to win. These kids have done a lot." Ovbiously. the remaining two tournaments are still ahead.
