seed in the opening game of the Bluestem Class 4A Sub-State by out-lasting the Cats, 53-46. The victory puts the Braves (17-5) in the sub-state semifinals Friday night, March 6, against Circle in a 6 p.m. game.

The Wildcats had only 11 points at halftime and were down by 21 before starting the long road back in the third and fourth quarters. Mulvane actually pulled to within two with three minutes left but Council Grove made free throws down the stretch to blunt the comeback.

"We just couldn't put the ball in the basket in the first half," emphasized Cat Coach Charlie Mason. "We were 3 of 22 from the field in the first half. We were tight and just didn't knock down the shots. We had the good shots but they wouldn't go down. We were long. It seemed like our shots were hitting the back of the rim."

The underdog Wildcats closed out this campaign at 3-18 overall and 1-11 in the Chisholm Trail League.

The only problem with falling so far off the pace is the energy it takes to get back in the game. It leaves you nothing in the stretch. "It takes so much effort to come back," agreed the veteran coach. 'The simple fact is they made the shots when they had to and we didn't. When we cut it to two points, we came down and quickly fouled a kid who was 0-4 at the line, but he stepped up and made them. In fact, he hit six in a row down the stretch."

That virtually slammed the door on Mulvane's rally and the Cats never did get back to within a pair. The Braves hit eight of 14 free throws in the last quarter.

"The game was like two separate games," added Mason, "theirs in the first half and ours in the second. We came out after intermission and picked up the defen-

sive pressure. We went to a 1-3-1 trap, which we had used just a few times in the first half. It became pretty effective for us. We also went to a zone defense and forced them to shoot a lot of outside shots."

Council Grove started missing (the Braves went 7-for-20 in the second half) and Mulvane started hitting (the Cats were 13-27 from the field after going a miserable 3-for-22 in the first half).

"The kids seemed to relax in the second half and the shots started falling," said Mason. "I don't know what you could attribute that to but it could be the long bus ride to Council Grove. We felt like we were ready to take over but they hit those two free throws. Those were big free throws."
