

Wildcats Add Two Two More Victories

Clutch free throws decided the game Tuesday night, as Rick Farber tossed in two charity tosses with two seconds remaining to put the icing on a one point Wildcat lead. Farber hit the last two to put the Wildcats up by three, 50-47, before time ran out.

The Wildcats led by five points with 1:43 left to play after out scoring Burrton 8-2 in a 2 and a half minute period, but two quick buckets brought the Burrton Chargers right back into the game. And, with 41 seconds left the Wildcats led by only one, 47-46. A free throw by Terry Craig with 17 seconds left, gave the Wildcats a two point lead but was not enough to assure victory. With four seconds remaining to play the Chargers had a chance to tie up the ball game. Burrton hit the first of a 1 and 1 but missed on the second attempt, Farber rebounded, and was fouled.

The score was knotted at the end of the third quarter 32-32. The Chargers had led by three at one time during the third stanza, but the Wildcats came back, knotted it at 30-30, and then traded pointers for the final third period reading.

The cats biggest lead was 7 points at the beginning of the second period, and the Chargers biggest lead was three occurring midway through the third period. The game was tied 9 different times, and the lead changed hands on 8 different occasions. The tightly knitted, closely fought battle provided the cat fans with more excitement than any game so far this season.

Craig Levering was high point man with 12 counters. Rick Farber and Max Nichols took second place honors with 11 points each. Farber led the defensive effort grabbing off 16 caroms. Coach Harris said he was pleased with the defensive effort of the Wildcats but was slightly dissappointel in the number of turnovers.

Friday the Wildcats play host to the Andover Trojans. This will be the second league game of the season. The Wildcats are now 1-0 in league play and 4-0 overall.
