If nothing else, the Mulvane High School Wildcat boys are exciting! But can Coach Ryan Herrs stand all that excitement?

The Wildcats' penchant for getting the lead, then watching it wash away in the fading moments of a game continued in the final two rounds of the Andale Arrowhead Shootout Friday and Saturday, Dec. 13-14, but the last round had a slightly different twist, the Cats won!

And they followed that up Tuesday night. Dec. 17, at home by getting away from the script...they got ahead, then, oh my, held on down the stretch to hand \*Clearwater a 62-57 setback in a game played at the MHS gym.

This time it was different. This time, the Cats handled the pressure. Ahead 58-52, with about 1:50 to play, Clearwater hit a three-pointer to cut the margin to 58-55 with 1/44 left. Guard Luke Gunter answered with a slick pass cutting down the middle to Gavin Snider under the bucket. Two points. Greg Flores followed after an Indian miss with a free throw but Clearwater cut it to four again, 61-57 with 48 seconds to tick.

And the Cats held their ground, Good detense, blocking out under the offensive boards and playing for the moment. Zach Kimble put a lid on it with one free throw with 18 seconds left.

Junior Guard Greg Flores knocked down live "threes" and finished with 22 points for the Wildeats. Kimble scored 18, Gavin Snider had 10 and seniors Tyler Hennes and Dusty Solensen scored six and four, respectively, as the Cats won their second game in a row.

In their first win, the Wildeats followed "their script" to perfection in the first three quarters, burying Douglass under a mountain as they took a 30-20 halftime lead and made it 41/24 going into the final 12 minares before putting the Douglass boys down in for Mulvane's first victory of the season, a 49-33 conquest of the Bulldogs.

A night earlier against Rose Hill, the Wildcats led much of the contest only to let Rose Hill scramble from behind in the final quarter for a 53-45 Rocket victory.

The Douglass game gave the Cats a 1-3 record. "That's the good part of that game, we got a 'W'," said Coach Herrs, "I wasn't overly impressed with our play, but we execute really, really well. What I am concerned most about is that we don't finish things. When we start hitting those shots, we're going to be a good team. Right now, I think the kids are thinking too much. You just need to forget about it and and play ball. Quit thinking about all the scenarios."

In Mulvane's three previous losses, the cals were ahead or right there going into the final quarter but they have had difficulty closing a game. You snooze, you lose!

Gunter had five and Grant Smider scored four

"These kids are having to invent how to win for themselves," said Herrs, "For the first time, I have a group of kids who really want to. It really means a lot to them and each one wants to do whatever it takes to get a victory."


Herrs was really happy with his club's defense. "Until the last 1:30 of the 4th quarter, they had only hit three shots from the field in the second half," said Herrs, "That tells you something. Herrs anticipates a season of excitement. Either the Cats will learn what it takes against pressure defenses or every game will be a nail-biter. "If people pressure you, you have to beat it and make them pay at the basket," said Herrs, "Our kids want to get past that struggling against the press, and I believe they will."

Kimble was outstanding against the Rockets, who raised their record to 3-0 against the Cats, scoring 19 points. Gunter scored eight points, Hennes and Gavin Snider
