"We didn't do very a very good job of hitting the ball," confessed Charlie Mason, the MHS coach. "Fortunately, our defense and Susan's pitching held up. It was her first shutout of the year and it came at the right time.

Freshman Jessica Sheridan started the game by walking and scored when Janelle

Wenke reached on an error. Wenke scored after a stolen base and a passed ball when Shelley Richards grounded out.

Mulvane's scoring was much more legitimate in the fourth. Richards drilled a single to centerfield and scored on a single by Lee Cates. Cates stole second and scored when Crissy Carpenter's grounder went between the second baseman's legs for an error. Carpenter stole two bases and scored when Wenger's hit squirted off the third baseman's mitt.

The Cats finished with only three hits-Kendrick had a leadoff single in the fifth inning, but it was enough to advance Mulvane into the next round.
