It was a different problem Monday. Although the Wildcats evened their record at 2-2 by sweeping the Indians, 6-0 and 7-1, it wasn't all fun and games. "We played well against Medicine Lodge, but I thought we played better against Valley in the openers. We just didn't hit the ball like we did against Valley. The speed of pitching made it difficult to adjust to after seeing Valley Center's pitchers. It took us most of the first game to adjust to the pitching."

Mason said the Mulvane defense was solid throughout against the Indians. "We didn't make a whole lot of hard plays but we made the plays we needed to," stressed Mason.
