"Both teams had a chance to win it and both teams had a chance to lose it," said · Mason. "We had two runners thrown out at 3rd base and one runner thrown out at the plate. And our defense made numerous plays, too, to keep them from scoring. In the end, they executed when they had to."

The end came suddenly, just after the fans had gone to get another big box of popcorn, figuring this thing could go all night. Simpson, who issued only three walks and fanned 11 batters, walked the lead-off hitter in the 17th. The Rockets tried to bunt her over and the Wildcats tried to get the runner at second but both were safe. Another sac attempt ended with Mulvane nailing the runner at 3rd base. However, the next batter, No. 9 in the batting order, fined a double that broke the ice and gave RH a 1-0 lead.

Mason opted for the percentage play by walking the next batter to fill the sacks with only one out and the plan looked good for an out but Nicole Ringwall blasted a triple to clear the bases and give the Rockets a 4-0 lead with three outs to play.

Beran was up to the task and she continued mowing down Mulvane batters with a 1-2-3 17th to end the game.

The Wildcats had their chances but couldn't ring the bell. In the 4th inning, nerve-wracking kind of game but the strate- Melissa Doerfer led off with a single and Dani Phillips reached on an error. Both runners advanced in a double steal but the meat of the Mulvane order couldn't produce.

Katie Rose singled, went to second on a wild pitch and stole third with one out in the 5th but Beran got the next two batters without a breakthrough. Josalyn Marksberry singled to start the 10th but was cut down trying for 3rd base on an overthrow.

Perhaps the best threat came in the 11th for Mulvane. Doerfer, who went 3-for-6, singled again and went to second on Dani Phillips' single. But Doerfer was cut down at 3rd when Danielle Vanderhoof tried to move the runners over and the inning ended with two runners on.

"It's just too bad somebody had to lose that one," said Mason, "especially us. It was an incredible game."

In the second game, Rose Hill bounced ahead quickly, scoring three times against freshman Shayna Duncan, and added five more in the 5th, but the Wildcats kept pecking away, hanging around until the last at bat when they made a bold attempt to split the series when trailing, 8-3. Phillips started the rally with a single and Vanderhoof walked. Both girls moved up on a steals. Duncan grounded out and Phillips scored. Sara Clasen, who went 2-for-3, rapped an

RBI single and so did Sara McKnight. When Clasen and McKnight both scored on passed balls, Rocket skipper Kathy Santo brought in Beran, who immediately fanned the final two hilters.

"We were still a little down in the first inning and they jumped on us but we fought back," said Mason. "We hit so many balls right at people but they made the plays. There was good defense on both sides. I think that's about as good a defense as we can play. It would have been nice to come back and get Beran in that last game but we couldn't get it done even thought we out-hit them in both games."

Rose Hill pushed its record to 8-0 with the sweep, and the Cats slipped to 4-4.

The Wildcats will try to get back on the right track today (April 19) when they go to Buhler for two Chisholm Trail League games beginning at 4:30 p.m.
