On the scale of 1-10, Mulvane High School girls basketball coach Ron McMahon was thinking it was along the line of an 8.0.

The Wildcat girls may have taken it on the chin Friday night, Jan. 13, when Chaparral came a-calling for a Chisholm Trail League tiff, but it was more than just another loss to McMahon. The Roadrunners posted a 57-45 triumph.

"I was very happy, very pleased," stressed McMahon. "It seems we're coming back around to the type of basketball we want to play. It was nice to see the girls step up and score. And we also out-boarded them. Crissy Carpenter did a great job, Lee Cates stepped in there with a great job and handled the ball as well as scored and Carrie Burkhart also did a fine job."

Although the Cats slipped to 1-8 and 0-6 in the CTL, McMahon could see jumbo improvement showing through.

"I was totally happy with our guards' performance," added McMahon. "Crissy did a good job out there on the wing, not only putting in some points but she came in on the weak side. These girls are gaining more experience and getting for confident. The pressure is still hurting us, but not as much as in earlier games. This is because we're gaining experience and confidence, which is improving our ball-handling."

Chappy took a walk against Mulvane in the opening quarter, rolling out to a 17-7 lead before Mulvane got things back together. "The first quarter of the game was the game," said McMahon. "We were playing well but the ball wouldn't go down for us. The rest of the way, we played right along with them but that first quarter hurt us badly."

McMahon was pleased with his shooting and rebounding, too. The Wildcats hit 32% from the field while the Roadrunners hit 40%. Mulvane controlled the boards by a 36-23 count. "Janelle Wenke did a good job," put a couple back in," said the Mulvane field general. "Crissy did a super job rebounding, too, and so did Danielle Hughes. Heidi Parker came in and picked up a couple boards and so did Valerie Larson. I was real happy with our rebounding because everybody was lending a hand,"

McMahon feels the Wildcat girls are only a step or two from being able to win consistently, "When you look at it, we're getting there, but we still have a long ways
