"Mary only took 10 shots," pointed out Brown. "To be effective, we have to have her shooting 15-to-20 times. We want her to take those shots and she didn't. They doubled up on her and kept her from getting the pass. When that happens, that's okay because that means someone else is open but we didn't have anyone else putting the ball in the hole."

"We beat these people before and Mary only scored eight points; so it wasn't so much a matter of stopping Mary as everybody else not able to put it down. We had a lot of opportunities in the fourth quarter but we couldn't put a bunch of two-footers down." Overall, the Cats made only 23% from the field, 14 of 60.
