The Cats outgunned Rose hill, 28-17, in the last half.

It was the first time in three games that the Cats were able to win against Rose Hill and handed the Wildcats their 2nd Chisholm Trail League win this year.

"That's a win we definitely needed, especially after the way we performed in the game two weeks ago against them. We just took ourselves out of that game by playing out of our tempo. Tuesday night, though, we took better shots and did a better job keeping them off their offensive glass."

Miller also took a little different defensive approach, playing a zone that was packed tight inside and eliminated the Rocket inside game. "We played a zone just trying to mix things up and I thought the girls did a great job taking their inside game, away and making them play perimeter-oriented. We got lucky because they didn't hit their outside shots."

The Maize Eagles showed the Mulvane High girls why they are ranked in the top five in Class 6A in the state and it didn't take them long to make their point.

After one quarter, it was 10-2 and by intermission, Mulvane had scored only nine points and the Eagles were on their way to another lopsided victory over the Cats, 58-23, Tuesday night, Feb. 18, in Maize.

The Wildcats never got started offensively. They were held to single digits in all four quarters. Earlier this season in Mulvane, Maize pounded the Cat girls, 60-35.

The Eagles brought too much pressure and dominated the backboards against the Wildcats to control the contest.

Junior Shayna Duncan had eight points to pace the Cat offense. Melissa Doerfer scored five points and Whitney Becker had four.
