Lights Out On Mulvane Girls' Year

The lights dimmed, then went down slowly on the Mulvane High School girls basketball season as the seconds ticked away Monday night, March 2, at Kingman.

It was kind of like the Wildcat offense. A season of scoring difficulty came to a close Monday night in the opening game of the Mulvane Class 4A Sub-State for the Wildcats as Kingman held on for a 40-36 triumph.

The loss ended the year for Coach Kelly Dennis' girls with a 6-15 record. Kingman (8-13) advanced into the semifinal round tonight (March 5), playing No. 1 seeded Clearwater (19-2) at 6 p.m. in the MHS gym. Wellington (6-15) and No. 3 seeded Rose Hill (14-7) tangle at 7:30.

Dennis was beside herself after the game. "It was the same old story, we couldn't get any offense generated," said Dennis. "Our defense did the job, and we did the job rebounding, but its hard to win when you don't shoot the ball."

The Wildcats held Kingman to 40 points after the Eagles had scored 60 or more the last five games. "We had some trouble inside," said Dennis. "Our outside defense did a great job but our post defense wasn't very good. Our rotation was poor but that's not what beat us. What beat us was our inability to score, and our inability to know what to do in certain situations."

The Wildcat girls got off to a horrible start, although Kingman couldn't pull away. "We played a terrible first quarter," pointed out Dennis. "The girls were so nervous. We threw the ball away, we travelled. We couldn't do anything. Thank God, Shelley was shooting the ball. That's the only thing that saved us early." The poor start didn't really give

Kingman a big edge because the Eagles could only manage an 8-7 lead in the first quarter and when the Cats continued to struggle offensively in the second quarter, their defense kept the game close. Mulvane only trailed, 18-13, at intermission. Neither team could pull away. The

Wildcats finally tied the score in the fourth quarter with about three minutes left to play. That's when it would have been nice to have an offensive threat to go to. "We won a lot of key games a year ago by having someone we could go to. We just didn't have anyone develop this year. Nobody seemed to want to get the ball when we needed a basket. We had the game tied up and had the ball three different times in the last quarter. In fact, it was tied up most of the time in the last quarter but we never could get the lead. We went about three minutes in the fourth quarter without scoring." Junior Shelley Richards finished the game with nine points, tying senior Melissa

Buchanan for high honors. Jackie McColpin dumped in eight points and Lindsay Kendrick finished with four. "Shelley had eight in the first half," added the Wildcu coach. "We tried to move

her around in the second half but we started getting good shots inside. We just didn't knock them down. That's been a problem all season long and it just never went away."

A flood of free throws drowned the Wildcat girls in their final regular season game of the year Thursday night, Feb. 26, at Circle. The Cats rallied from more than 20 points down but came up short as the Thunderbirds held on for a 59-51 victory.

The loss dropped Mulvane's girls to 6-14 overall and to 3-9 and a 6th place finish in the Chisholm Trail League. Circle ended its regular season at 13-7 and in 4th place in

the CTL with a 6-6 record.

Melissa Buchanan had seven boards to pace the Cats. Kristin Buchanan had five, as did Richards and Heather Williams had three.

"I was really pleased the way we come back but I thought the girls gave up a little
