the bottom side of the blocks, and both Heather Taylor and Lee Cates really gave us a lot of good hustle."

RH rolled out to a 19-11 lead after one quarter and led, 38-20, by intermission on the strength of a 50% shooting mark from the field. In the second half, Mulvane outscored the Rockets but it wasn't enough to come back.

Senior Lee Banzet had another big outing, scoring 18 points. Cody Watson had 10 points and both Jamie Martin and Renfro scored four points.

In the junior varsity game, the Wildcats exploded in the second and last quarter for 22 points on their way to a 24-19 comeback win. Martin led the Cats with eight points and Renfro, Heidi Parker and Shannon Reed scored four points each.

Close doesn't count for much, but the Wildcat girls played tough in the seventh place game before losing to Wellington Saturday afternoon, Dec. 11, in the Circle Thunderbird Girls Classic.

Coach McMahon's Wildcats rallied late in the game but fell short, 38-37, to the Crusaders, dropping their record to 0-4 for the year.

Mulvane was knocked into the seventh place game Thursday, Dec. 9, when Andover romped to a 71-41 winner. Wellington couldn't handle Sunrise in a semifinal match-up and lost, 55-41, to set up the Chisholm Trail League duel for seventh.

Circle ended up staking out its claim to the Thunderbird Classic championship Saturday night by edging Independence, 59-56, for the title.

"We didn't lack anything with respect to heart, hustle and desire," said McMahon.

"We played with a lot of intensity and desire. What happened was we made a few mistakes at the end of the game. We tried to put the ball up by forcing it and that hurt. And we had some turnovers. Wellington also made some threes throughout the game and that hurt. Wellington just converted on those mistakes. It was as simple as that."

Another factor was the outstanding defensive job the Crusaders did on Mulvane's top scorer, Cody Watson. She was held to only two points. "They keyed on our high scorer and that may have stopped her scoring but it didn't stop her in the defensive end or in rebounding because she did a great job," said McMahon. "She did a great job on both ends of the floor and her hustling was outstanding."

In a battle of winless teams, Wellington held on at the end. One of the big differences was that the Crusaders hit five three-point goals. Every time the Cats moved close, Wellington gunners hit a three to help gain momentum.

"Our defense really came through for us," said McMahon. "We ran a match-up. They had two good outside shooters but we did a good job covering them with Heather Taylor, Lee Cates and Jamie Martin.

"It was just a matter of two evenly-matched teams, and our inexperience finally showed up a little. When you have to starters on the bench and are still playing even with them, you have to be pleased with the job everybody is going."

McMahon said Martin became a sparkplug after coming in in the first quarter. He also praised the play at both ends of the floor of Heather Taylor. "Lee Banzet also had a totally great game," said McMahon. Cates chipped in with 10 points and Martin and Taylor finished with six and four points, respectively, against the Crusaders.

In the semifinal loss to Andover, the Trojans got things rolling behind standout guard Susan Woolf by out-scoring MHS, 21-13, in the second quarter, then Woolf knocked down four straight three-pointers in the third quarter as the Trojans put the game away by out-scoring the Wildcats, 25-8.

Watson sparkled on the Cat offense, scoring 17 points before fouling out. Banzet finished with nine points, followed by Cates and Courtney Renfro with four points apiece.
